Question:

When the chemist or chmst-ps package is loaded, roman upright fonts are selected in chemical equations, e.g.,

$$C + O_2 \longrightarrow CO_2 \tag{1}$$

which is produced by the following code:

\begin{ChemEquation}
C + 0_2 \longrightarrow CO_2
\end{ChemEquation}

How can we work with sanserif fonts?

Answer:

Because the font in such chemical equations is specified by the \ChemEqFont command, the \sf command is introduced by using the $\le \cite{temEqFont}$ command as follows:

The code typesets:

$$C + O_2 \longrightarrow CO_2$$
